

How You Can Help

- **Click to watch the page.**
 - If you have a Wikipedia account, please click the star at the top right of the page to watch it. This will alert you to changes and help us collectively monitor its stability.
- **Add citations and small edits.**
 - Adding even a single citation or clarifying a sentence greatly strengthens the page and signals active expert oversight.
- **Cross-link related pages.**
 - Linking from relevant Wikipedia pages in your areas of expertise (law, psychology, human rights, etc.) helps integrate the page into the broader knowledge ecosystem.

Even small contributions — adding a single citation, refining a sentence, or correcting a typo — help build the page’s stability and credibility over time.

Translations: Easy and Impactful

Once the English page is stable in the coming months, we will launch translations in the fall, aiming for 25–30 language versions by year’s end.

Translating a page is surprisingly easy: Wikipedia’s built-in translation tool preserves formatting and citations automatically; **all you need is language expertise** to adapt the text accurately.
